- Does our building turn people off? Do we look like the current and future or just the past.

- Known for community suppers

- Seen as welcoming, right in the middle of the town.
- Seen as welcoming, opening, every year at Xmas seats filled up because people will be accepted and welcomed. Rainbow flag.

- People see us as a kind, welcoming, open community and wants to continue to be seen that way.
- Thrilled we stand up for Ukraine; the vigil stopped people in the street and it was extremely moving; caring for people we don't know and people in the community see it.
- Summer lyceum is an important part of how the community sees us; many non members come to that and it gives community people a view about the church.
- We're seen as pretty favorable as accepting, except by people who don't want to be accepting or don't like the rainbow flag.
- Don't know Peterborough community b/c does not live here.
- Building has important physical presence in the community; it's often in photos of the town. It's a bedrock in the community and intellectually as well.
- Perceives positive awareness in the community. Proud to say they go to the unitarian church on Sunday morning.
- Community is a subjective word. Comes from outside Peterborough community so sees it as a larger community than Peterborough.
- The building is big and in the center of town. Community suppers, monthly social justice donations.
- Views rainbow flag not just for LGBTQ but a wider message of acceptance. Sending a message that we are accepting of everybody.
- The building is seen as a very positive influence b/c we welcome things like the Lyceum, community supper, Messiah; people are familiar with the building.
- Gets a "hmmm" if she tells someone that she goes here b/c there is no religion; not so good if you are not a Christian.
- A little bit of people not knowing what we are, think we are a little off the beaten track.
- Does not like words church or worship. Says "we are on our way to church" and it sounds so lame; does not think of us as a church. No one is saying you have to believe in something in particular. Very different and does not think of it as a church.
- MLT see articles about people from PUUC in paper, creates favorable impression of PUUC as a force for change DITTO
